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From the Dean's Desk

Dear Professors, Students, and Friends of the College,

Welcome back to campus and the Fañomnakan 2025 semester.

What is the purpose of any university? Does the history of the institution of the university impact the mission of the Unibetsedåt Guåhan? Last year, when the UOG community was developing the new strategic plan, two colleagues mentioned that UOG ought not to attempt to influence other communities. Given the horrors of colonialism, I can understand why some people might think that the university is merely an arm of a government that promotes colonial values. Any organizations, including governments, that fund universities will always promote their agenda and attempt to advance their beliefs, goals, and objectives. Although there is always a superficial agenda attached to any university, nevertheless, universities have a deeper, core value and mission to discover truth. Successful universities use the discovery of truth to inform their communities and humanity at large about the proper and best ways to advance human flourishing. By the "discovery of truth," I mean the discovery of specific truth claims about reality, the world, life, society, the economic and political order, and so on.

Harold Perkin's chapter entitled "History of Universities" builds an argument that it was only in Europe from the 12th Century onwards that universities accidentally grew out of a decentralized and fragmented "civilization." He says,

Unintentionally, it [the university] evolved into an immensely flexible institution, able to adapt to almost any political situation and form of society. In this way, it was able to survive for eight centuries and migrate, eventually, to every country and continent in the world (James Forest and Philip Altbach, eds., International Handbook of Higher Education. Netherlands, 2006, pp. 159-160).

His view is Eurocentric. Actually, every political organization, from the tribe to the nation-state, has at least a group of people, an informal think tank, if not a formal institution, seeking truth claims about the world and society so that they could advise the leaders on what course of action to take. These culturally diverse centers of discovery and learning were formalized and institutionalized to become the modern university. The success of universities is due to their ability to balance populist values with their discovered truth; that is, universities as centers of discovery and learning have been able to use their discovered truth to either reinforce cultural values that promote life or they are able to discredit and overturn incorrect or immoral cultural values. For example, universities were able to discern and promote the heliocentric solar system and that slavery is immoral.

Perkin argues that because European universities were able to play off the power of the state and civil law against the church and canon law, giving it the elasticity and power to think innovatively and advance knowledge, leading to wise actions that promoted human flourishing. We can expand his model and propose that current universities must balance the power of populist false beliefs with scientific facts to promote human flourishing and a better future for all. Therefore, as members of a university, we must work to help others improve their lot in life. UOG's vision is to transform lives and advance communities. To do this, we must discover truth, share it, enlighten others, and serve them and their communities.

As members of a university it is incumbent upon us to discover truth (Deskubre), use that truth to enlighten others (Ina) to serve our community and humanity (Setbi).

Wishing you a productive and fun-filled Fañomnakan 2025 semester.





Volume 15 will be available online in February 2025.




Trivia Night | Team Registration
