I. Prerequisite

II. COURSE DESCRIPTION

This course introduces students to descriptive linguistics, where students and instructor work together to discover the grammar of a language. We will explore different facets of grammar patterns in various languages, and a language will be chosen to describe its morphological and syntactic structure in the course. Students will understand different grammatical patterns of languages and the structure of the chosen language by collecting data and analyzing them. The goal of this course is to describe and document a language's grammar and to understand linguistic differences between the chosen language and English. Students will learn how complex and yet systematic languages are.



VI. REQUIREMENTS AND EXPECTATIONS

A. ATTENDANCE:

C. PARTICIPATION AND CLASS ETIQUETTE:

Participation is vital in this class (20% of the grade) since participation in class, such as collecting data and having critical thinking to analyze them, is crucial in documentary linguistics course. *Extra credit may be given for excellent participation.* However, *more participation points will be deducted if you don't have proper etiquette*:

- <u>Don't leave the room</u> during class, unless absolutely necessary.
- Cell phones and internet use are not permitted.
- If you are a big talker, make sure to let others talk too. Respect each other's right to express ideas and be respectful of others while expressing your ideas.

Also, let me know in advance if you have challenges with internet connectivity.

- Otherwise, I expect that **your video is turned on at all times**. Even if you can't do so due to technical issues, I expect you to participate in class.
- Mute yourself except when you speak.
- Find a quiet place where you don't get disturbed. Otherwise, use a microphone when speaking, so other noise can be reduced.
- Don't chat with your family during online sessions although you might be tempted to do so.

D. PLAGIARISM:

The term "plagiarism" includes, but is not limited to, the use, by paraphrase or direct quotation, of the published or unpublished work of another person without full and clear acknowledgment.
