## Fall 2024 Course Syllabus

<u>Catalog Course Description:</u> This course is an introduction to the traditional and western history of the Micronesian Islands.

During the course of the semester, the focus of Micronesian history will be on Republic of Belau, Federated States of Micronesia (Chuuk, Kosrae, Pohnpei, and Yap), Kiribati, Marshall Islands, Mariana Islands, and Nauru. We will cover a wide variety of historical topics, including pre-contact Micronesia, contact Micronesia, and present day Micronesia inclusive of contemporary struggles for political and cultural sovereignty throughout Micronesia.

Students will learn, understand, and interpret the histories and historiographies of:

- Micronesia's pre-colonial past with attention to navigation and settlement, inter-island interactions, social and material culture etc...;
- Contact and interactions between Micronesians and Whalers, Traders, Missionaries and, and Miners;
- Spanish, German, Japanese, and American administrations in Micronesia
- Wartime oppression and postwar imperialism in Micronesia
- · Post-war economic, political, and cultural challenges throughout the region.

A project on a specific topic in Micronesia is required with a 3-5 page write up. Students must also present their project in class to share the wealth with their classmates. Topics must be approved by the instructor first.

Short quizzes will be given and be announced in advance in class.

Note: All cell phones must be turned off during class period.

Attendance will be calculated into students' final grade. See below for the breakdown.
